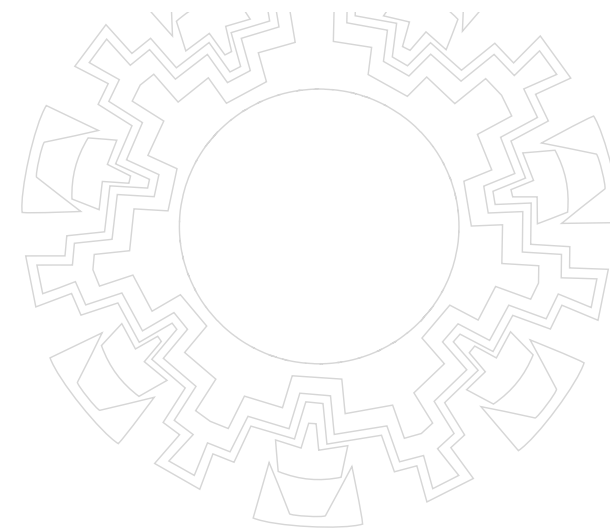

Another Better Chance - Boxing for Christ

Boxing for Christ works to help kids, teens, young adults, and adults strive for something better. Established in 2012 in the city of San Jacinto, more than 3,000 students have gone through its program. One of the students made it to the 2020 Olympics as an alternate and is now a professional boxer. The program has been recognized by multiple local organizations in the community and county wide. They have added monthly hygiene classes and an annual youth conference. The nonprofit's goal is to establish a Boxing Academy that integrates life skills classes as well as other programs to help kids, teens, young adults, and adults thrive, alongside the boxing program in the same building.



Care-A-Van

Care-A-Van provides transportation to seniors, disabled individuals, and people with low income in the Hemet-San Jacinto area. This service is for medical appointments, grocery shopping, etc. They also go to the VA Hospital in Loma Linda and VA Clinic in Murrieta for our Veterans. Care-A-Van Transit provides necessary safe and efficient transportation access services to seniors, disabled, and others in need. Transportation is also available to senior/community centers, community events and shopping trips for clothing, pharmacy pickups and more. All services are offered free of charge. A \$3.00 donation each way is requested but passengers are never turned away due to an inability to pay.



California Tribal Families Coalition

In 2017 a dedicated group of elected tribal leaders formed the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) Compliance Task Force, to propel forward a unified effort in the implementation of ICWA in California. This led to the formation of the California Tribal Families Coalition (CTFC), whose mission was to promote and protect the health, safety and welfare of tribal children and families which are inherent tribal governmental functions and at the core of tribal sovereignty and tribal governance. CTFC serves and is led by its member tribes, with nearly 50 of the 109 tribes in California as members but its work produces benefits for all tribal children and families in the state. CTFC members have amended over 50 provisions of the California Welfare and Institutions Code, trained more than 2,000 individuals in charge of implementing these policies and initiated three lawsuits to enforce these policies.

Friends of Valley-Wide Foundation



Since 1992, the Friends of Valley-Wide Foundation has been supporting local youth. The nonprofit has been recognized by the California Association of Recreation and Park District and the California Parks and Recreation Society for its fundraising efforts, program successes and for making sure that every child can participate in recreational programs by removing financial barriers that inhibit them from participating, as well as funding tangible recreational amenities benefiting the community. With a strong connection to the community and the purpose an active Recreation and Park District plays in neighborhoods, Friends are engaged in the broader community through integrated activities, programs and volunteer work.

Inter-Tribal Sports



Inter-Tribal Sports (ITS) provides athletic opportunities and values education in conjunction with cultural, physical, mental, and spiritual development. ITS furnishes youth and communities with occasions to build self-esteem, respect, acceptance, and sportsmanship through fun and positive activities, while developing athletic skill and forming friendships, guided by appropriate role models in a sound, structured program that is non-profit, volunteer-oriented, and open to all tribal youth. Inter-Tribal Sports began in Southern California in the Fall of 2002 and operated successfully in a grass-roots manner for five years. However, as the service area expanded, it was recognized that more structure would be necessary to accommodate the rapid growth and to meet the demand for organized youth sports from the tribal communities.

Michelle's Place Cancer Resource Center



Michelle's Place Cancer Resource Center is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization and the only All-Cancer resource center in the counties of San Bernadino, Riverside, and surrounding areas. Founded in 2001 as a breast cancer resource center, the organization expanded in 2018 to serve individuals and families with a diagnosis of any cancer. Michelle's Place currently serves about 3,200 clients diagnosed with cancer with more than 14,000 resources annually. All programs and services are free to the community and include, but are not limited to: one-on-one behavioral health appointments, financial resources, wellness classes, educational seminars and resources, comfort items (wigs, bras, prosthetics), and classes that build community.

MilVet

MilVet is a nonprofit dedicated to providing comprehensive resources through organizational outreach and philanthropic programs to enrich the lives of deployed military members, veterans, and their families. Programs include monthly military care packages, emergency veteran support, Holidays for Heroes and more. Its goal is to strengthen communities and improve the quality of life for all members through philanthropic programs, referrals, and community support. MilVet is a free resource connecting people in need to community programs and events in the private and public sector. It offers a proactive approach for self-sustainability for parents, children, veterans, seniors, and members of the community. MilVet also provides educational opportunities and workshops to improve quality of life through its partnerships with other programs.



Native Youth Foundation

Native Youth Foundation is a nonprofit that provides positive athletic and educational experiences for Indigenous youth and communities. Its goal is to empower Indigenous youth by providing sports seminars, led by professional athletes to Indigenous and other youth free of charge; challenging Indigenous and other youth to improve themselves physically through exercise and education; making educational, substance abuse, nutritional and other forms of counseling and advice available through seminars and other educational platforms; and, making athletic and non-athletic role models available to all youth. NYF partners with California Indigenous Athletes (CIA), a 7-on-7 football team that provides positive outlets for Indigenous youth. CIA is free to all youth in hopes of improving our athletes' skills physically, mentally, and spiritually.



San Jacinto Mountain Bike Team

The San Jacinto Mountain Bike Team has been coaching students in grades 6 through 12 since 2014. The team practices four days a week from December through May and participates in six to 10 races throughout Southern California. The coaches are current teachers at San Jacinto High School. The team strives to provide kids with the opportunity to ride bikes and receive the skills needed to continue riding into their adult lives. The team builds strong-minded individuals, confidence, and fitness among all riders. The San Jacinto Mountain Bike Team is committed to coaching all riders who show an interest and has continued a "no cut" policy throughout the past 10 years.



Soroptimist International – San Jacinto Hemet Valley Club

Soroptimist is a global women's organization with more than 72,000 members in about 121 countries and territories who support community-based and global projects benefiting women and girls. The local club, Soroptimist International - San Jacinto Hemet Valley, was chartered in 1961 and maintains 25 members. Its annual club projects that support the community are Live Your Dream Awards with cash awards to heads-of-household women who have returned to education; Dream It, Be It – Girl Power Conference, a one-day experience for middle school age girls to explore career opportunities; and, Community Service high school scholarships for senior girls with an emphasis on community service and student leadership roles in athletics and/or school clubs.



Valley Resource Center – EXCEED

EXCEED has provided quality programs and services to adults with disabilities since 1981, promoting independence and fostering individual growth, creativity, and community involvement. The nonprofit provides life-changing programs in areas such as social and life skills development, employment services, personal responsibility, self-care, and advocacy. The nonprofit operates sites in Hemet, San Jacinto, Perris, Murrieta, and Riverside, and serves nearly 600 individuals each year. As a nonprofit service organization, EXCEED places value on respect for all people, creating opportunities and choices, quality environment, self-directedness and the future. Part of its Code of Ethics states, "We will continually strive to better our industry and community through partnership, teamwork and cooperation."



Voices for Children

Voices for Children transforms the lives of abused, neglected, and abandoned children by providing them with trained, volunteer Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs). CASAs are volunteers from the community who advocate on behalf of children in foster care, ensuring that the children receive the services they need and the permanent home they deserve. A CASA gets to know a child's situation, communicates with professionals on the case, and makes sure the child's needs are being met. Over time, a CASA often becomes the most consistent person in a child's life. As the only agency designated by the courts to provide CASA volunteers in Riverside and San Diego counties, Voices for Children's CASAs play a crucial role in helping judges make the most informed decisions for children's futures.
